Greetings Edmore Patrons:

The days are getting longer and the temperatures are warming. I am sure we will continue to have winter for a few more months but the intensity of the sun tells us that spring is on the way.

As I write this correspondence our girls' basketball team will be traveling to Minot to participate in the state tournament. They have had a great season and we wish them well as they represent the Edmore community at the state tournament. Good luck girls.

School Safety

The latest school shooting in Florida has once again raised the level of debate regarding school safety. Solutions offered range from banning assault weapons to arming teachers in the school. In 2012 when I assumed duties as the superintendent it became apparent that law enforcement response time from Devils Lake to Edmore could be as long as 30 minutes. The traditional "Lock Down" procedure that originated in Los Angeles schools to respond to drive by shootings would not be appropriate for rural schools and in fact not appropriate as the sole manner of response to active shooter situations in public locations.

In the spring of 2015 I attended a two-day training along with numerous other school administrators and law enforcement personnel throughout the state. The training provided was A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate). The founder of A.L.I.C.E. was a law enforcement officer whose wife was an elementary school teacher. He realized that lockdown procedures were not adequate for school personnel in the event of school shooting and developed an alternative response measure.

Shortly after the workshop the Edmore staff and students were trained in A.L.I.C.E. and each month we practice fire, tornado, and active shooter drills. In a nutshell, A.L.I.C.E. training gives staff and students the ability to respond to an active shooter situation rather than sit quietly in a classroom waiting for 30 minutes for law enforcement to arrive.

In 2016 I was asked to serve on the North Dakota Small Organized Schools (NDSOS) board of directors. During this time I have provided testimony at the state legislative assembly regarding proposed legislation allowing trained staff to carry guns in schools. I would anticipate that this coming session NDSOS will be proposing that school personnel and students throughout the state receive training in A.L.I.C.E.

In closing, regardless of a person's opinion regarding trained school personnel carrying weapons in school the A.L.I.C.E. training is an invaluable training for staff and students to utilize in any situation. Edmore is ahead of the curve regarding A.L.I.C.E. training and hopefully our staff and students never have to put this training into action.

"Pennies for Patients" was a HUGE success. Our students raised \$1000 for children suffering from leukemia and lymphoma! The 8th grade won the pizza party for the high school and PreK, K, 1st won for the elementary.

Our Spring Student-Led Conferences are slated for Friday, March 9th. This is a very important time for the teachers to showcase the students and how hard they have worked. It is also a time for us to show you areas that your students could put extra efforts in throughout the remainder of the year and summer. A reminder that you can reach out to the teachers through email or a phone call at any time. I also remind all parents that PowerSchool reflects your child's grades on a weekly basis and I encourage you to check this weekly and assess how your child is doing. The teachers are posting at least 2 grades per week and you are able to see if your child has completed the work or missing any assignments, etc. that could affect their grades and eligibility to participate in extracurricular events.

Quarter 3 will be ending on March 23rd. Report cards will be sent home the following week with the students.







Science News with Mr. Metz

6th and 7th Grade Science - We have been studying the atmosphere and weather. Ask your child – "What causes a Thunderstorm?" The Lab is about absolute and relative humidity in the air.










8th and 9th Grade Science - We also have been working on Atmosphere and Air pollution. What causes wind and air masses. What causes air pollution and what we can do to fix the problem. Here is a lab where they learned to use a homemade psychrometer.









10th and 11th Grade Chemistry - We have been working on Stoichiometry and calculations. We just took a test on Friday and today we started on different phases of matter and their changes - moving into Gas Laws and Gas behavior soon.

12th grade Anatomy - Just finished up on the Nervous System, took a test on Friday - starting the Endocrine system today.



12th grade Advanced Chemistry - Just finished Thermochemistry in the College book - finishing up a quantitative lab on Alum we made. Starting Reaction Kinetics - How temperature and concentrations affect the rate of Chemical reactions. They will have to brush off their graphing calculations and natural logarithms.

Music News



We are working their area and circumference.


8th Grade:


In the English Classroom



All of the English student are deep into their research papers for 3rd quarter. If you recall from previous newsletters, the entire school focuses on a specific type of writing for each quarter. First quarter all Edmore students worked on personal narratives, second quarter focused on expository texts, and next quarter will be opinion papers. One great thing about the research papers is that the students' papers are as diverse as they each are as individuals. One student is writing about the harmful effects of fast


food, another is writing about espionage, and one student is even writing about how the evolution of video game consoles.

The 6th and 7th graders, as well as the 9th graders, are pulling double duty with culture fair and researching their ancient civilizations. It's great to do a cross-curricular project with Mrs.



Newgard because the students are able to dive deeper into their topics while

meeting both social studies and English language arts state standards.



In addition to research papers, students are working on expanding their vocabulary, deciphering informational texts through close reading and annotating, and also focusing on various areas of grammar. Our daily bellringers for this quarter all relate to parts of speech or writing.



Title 1 News

There are a number of steps that parents can take to help prepare their young children to become readers and to support the reading habit once they are in school. These include:

- Feed your child a diet of rich language experiences throughout the day. Tell stories, sing songs, recite nursery rhymes or poems.
 Encourage your child's efforts to talk with you.
- Read aloud to your children for 30 minutes daily beginning when they are infants.
- Have your child's eyesight and hearing tested early and annually.
 If you suspect your child may have a disability, seek help.
- Seek out child care providers who spend time talking with and reading to your child.
- Ask your child's teacher for an assessment of your child's reading level, and ways in which you can bolster your child's literacy skills at home.
- Limit the amount and kind of television your children watch. Seek out educational television or videos that you can watch and discuss with your children.
- Set up a special place for reading and writing in your home. A
 well-lit reading corner filled with lots of good books can become a
 child's favorite place. Keep writing materials such as non-toxic

- crayons, washable markers, paints and brushes, and different kinds of paper in a place where children can reach them.
- Visit the public library often to spark your child's interest in books. Help your children obtain their own library cards and pick out their own books. Talk to a librarian, teacher, school reading specialist, or bookstore owner for guidance about what books are appropriate for children at different ages and levels.
- You are your child's greatest role model. Demonstrate your own love of reading by spending quiet time in which your child observes you reading. Show your child how reading and writing help you get things done every day-cooking, shopping, driving, or taking the bus.
- Consider giving books or magazines to children as presents or as a recognition of special achievements. Special occasions, such as birthdays or holidays, can be the perfect opportunity to give a child a new book.




