Public Dissolution Meeting

On December 11th the school board sought input from patrons regarding the dissolution process for the Edmore school. The meeting was very well attended with about 90 patrons attending. There were many questions and comments shared throughout the meeting. Questions and comments ranged from how the land gets divided, to how will assets be sold, to what are the plans for the building after the district is dissolved.

The school board listened to the comments and questions and will continue to develop the dissolution plan that will be presented to the Ramsey County Reorganization board in late January or early February. Once the plan is approved at the county level the plan will then be presented to the State Reorganization board in March or April. Once the plan is approved at the State level the plan is finalized and implementation of the plan will begin July 1, 2024.

The school board has placed one of the staff residences up for bids. The details are on the Edmore school website for anyone interested in submitting a bid for the residence.

The school board continues to make decisions that they believe are in the best interests of the students and patrons of the Edmore School District. These decisions are not easy and I commend the board for their commitment to the district and surrounding communities.

On behalf of the staff, students, and Edmore school board, I would like to thank the Edmore school district patrons for their continued support of our most valuable resource, our children.

The Past Month

December was a short but sweet month for us. Kindergarten reviewed rhyming words and words with consonant cluster. We also finished reading a book entitled "Kit" that includes words from the tricky word list and words that have consonant cluster. We also learned the way of life of some of the Native Americans and got to compare how they used to live then and now. In Math we are counting, writing and understanding numbers 11-20. First graders continue reading words with long and short vowel sounds. They also finished a book entitled "Fables" that includes words from their tricky word list and words with long and short vowel sounds. They also learned about verbs from present and past tenses. They also had a chance to know about the early American civilization and they got to compare how we are living from them. In Math, first graders learned about tens and ones and were able to compare two numbers with the help of the place value. In Science, we learned about the plants and their young how similar and different they are. In Social Studies, we learned about the symbols of United States such as Uncle Sam, the Bald Eagle, and many more. In writing we were able to write two informative papers about their chosen animals.

This Month

This month kindergarten will begin a new skill in ELA and this will include learning words with digraphs (ch, sh, th, ng) and will be introduced to new tricky words. First graders will also begin a new skill in ELA and will be introduced to words with two-syllables. They will also be introduced to future tense of verbs and adjectives. In Math, kindergarten will learn to count numbers up to 100 by ones and tens. While first graders will continue comparing numbers and will begin to learn adding and subtracting tens. In K1 Science, we will still be learning about living things and their young. K1 Social Studies, we will learn more about the symbols and traditions of United States. And in writing they will still be writing more informative papers about their chosen animal. I am also excited to do some new artwork and explore more STEM activities.

Happy 2024! This month we will begin new lessons in almost all of our subjects. Please continue practicing reading, writing, adding and subtracting at home.

Time flies so fast. One more year had passed. Cheers to a fresh start and all the new lessons that lie ahead!


What have we learned? Spelling alternatives like /ue/> "u_e," "u," "ue," /aw/ > "augh," and /er/ > "er," "ir," and "ur" were covered in second grade ELA. Moreover, we studied the planning, drafting, and editing of personal narratives. We also read tales about the various natural life cycles. This month, we will read stories about the Westward Expansion and study spelling alternatives like /i/spelled 'y' (myth), ie/spelled 'y' (try), /igh' (night), /oe/spelled 'ow' (snow), /ee/spelled 'e' (me), 'y' (funny), 'ey' (key), and /aw/spelled 'al' (wall).

We studied fables, myths, and stories from ancient Roman civilization in third grade ELA. Additionally, we learned how to identify the author's point of view, express an opinion, and recognize facts. In grammar, we brainstormed adjectives, adverbs, and synonyms that might add to the sentence to make it a new and more interesting one. This month, we will read more about light and sound and will learn how to plan, draft, and edit a news article.

In addition, both grades have a weekly spelling.

In mathematics, 3rd graders used place value to compare and order two- and three-digit numbers. Along with learning how to estimate lengths and distances, we also studied how to estimate sums and differences and how to measure various items using inches, feet, and yards. Additionally, we constantly review our previous lessons with Ms. Worley using the Power Up activity. The naming of fractions using words, symbols, and probabilities will be covered next.

CHINESE CARTER

Two people hold both ends of a stretched garter horizontally while the others attempt to cross over it. The goal is to cross without having tripped on the garter. With each round, the garter's height is made higher than the previous round (the game starts with the garter at ankle-level, followed by knee-level, until the garter is positioned above the head). The higher rounds demand dexterity, and the players generally leap with their feet first in the air, so their feet cross over the garter, and they end up landing on the other side. Also, with the higher levels, doing cartwheels to "cross" the garter is allowed.


The students in 7th grade are going to read the miraculous case of Phineas Gage and his brain. They will also read about the Teenage Brain.

Topics like Pronoun-Antecedent, Verb Tenses, and Adjectives will be studied.









Writing


This quarter, the students are to write research papers. Topics will be asked to be given the week after the semester tests.

MATHEMATICS by: Mrs. Hernander

Math 6

In sixth grade, we currently learning about expressions and properties. We identified parts algebraic expressions and wrote mathematical written expressions words into symbols. As we proceed, we will solve problems using algebraic expressions and interpret algebraic expressions real-life problems.

Math 7


The seventh grade will be learning expressions this month. They will have a deeper understanding algebraic expressions. the end of the lessons, they will be doing performance task entitled "Chlorophyll Plants." in Students will combine like terms to simplify algebraic expressions. Then, they will evaluate expressions to find the cost of a science fair project. They will also factor variable expressions to find length of the the rectangular region and evaluate the expression to find the length.

Math 8

The eighth grade will be studying graphing and writing linear equations. The slope of a line will be introduced, and a connection to proportional relationships will be made. The remainder of the chapter's lessons are about writing and graphing linear equations in various forms: slope-intercept, standard, and point-slope.

Algebra 1

In ninth grade, we are currently deepening our understanding of systems of linear equations. We describe different methods of solving systems of linear equations - by graphing, substitution, or elimination. We also analyze systems of linear equations and decide what solution method is most efficient.

Geometry

tenth-grade The students have been learning about relationships within triangles. They identified and used perpendicular and bisectors of angle triangles. They used medians and altitudes of triangles to solve problems. They also compare measures within triangles and between two triangles.



THIS MONTH IN SCIENCE

Our Learning Focus:

Life Science

We have discussed with our sixth and seventh graders the concepts of photosynthesis and cellular respiration and how these processes are in charge of the exchange of carbon dioxide and oxygen between living things and their environment. Their creativity is demonstrated by the spear-tooth shark board game they designed, which highlights the influence of matter, energy flow, and both genetic and environmental factors on the growth of spear-tooth sharks.




Our eighth-graders looked at the several forces that shape the surface of the Earth. In addition, they have created several models that mimic the physical and chemical weathering of rocks, the occurrence of crystals in igneous rocks, the metamorphism of rocks through contact, and the spreading of the seafloor to produce new crust.

Physical Science

Our ninth-grade talked about the role of chemistry in the properties of particular ingredients and the outcomes of chemical processes while presenting their dish for the culminating project. They classified the ingredients into mixtures, elements, or compounds, then used their knowledge of polarity, chemical reactions, solubility, and acids and bases to explain why certain ingredients combine readily and the importance of specific steps in preparing the dish. The importance of chemistry in our daily lives was highlighted by her explanation of the process needed in creating a Coconut Poke Cake.

Biology

Our tenth-graders studied how DNA controls the synthesis of proteins. They used models to study the information transfer from DNA to RNA to proteins. In addition, they found that mutations can be neutral, detrimental, or helpful. They engaged in hands-on activities such as separating DNA from strawberries, classifying enzymes as proteins, and studying biological macromolecules.


