Edmore Public School September 2023 Greetings Parents/Guardians:

The first full month of school is upon us and our staff and students have settled into their routines. Our three new teachers from the Philippines are adjusting to rural North Dakota life and enjoying the process of acclimating to our rural culture.

In addition to the three new staff members, we have two new students joining the Edmore family. We welcome them all to the community and hope they have a memorable experience in rural North Dakota.

Legislative Interim Education Issues

During the interim of legislative sessions, committees meet to discuss K12 educational issues that may need addressing at future legislative sessions. Several topics that will be discussed include:

Virtual Instruction – The committee will discuss whether the practice of allowing a school district to use virtual instruction rather than a storm day should remain. The Edmore parents and students prefer virtual instruction rather than making up-a school day. Our staff and students utilize the Zoom platform and students are engaged in academics for the entire school day. It is the school board members' hope that local control remains for individual districts to decide if virtual learning is appropriate for their school.

Ending Fund Balance – Since Covid emerged and ESSER monies became available to school districts, the legislators have suspended century code requiring ending general fund balance limits. Although limiting ending fund balances may be appropriate in certain situations, it can drastically limit a school board if an emergency emerges such as a boiler going out or other major facility need. Once again, these decisions should remain with the individual school board and their patrons to determine the amount of carry-over that best fits the needs of their school district.

Yearly Budget Meeting -- Each year every public entity that has the ability to levy taxpayer monies is required to have a public meeting and allow for public input regarding the budget. This year, the Edmore school will have a meeting on September 12th at 7 pm in the gym. The Edmore school board has determined that they will lower the mill levy to approximately 60 mills for the 2023-2024 school year. The board has the legal authority to levy 105 mills but has determined that it is not necessary to raise the levy to this level as district expenditures do not require the additional dollars to operate. When district patrons review their preliminary tax statement, they may see that the valuation of their property has gone up. As the Edmore school board has lowered the mills approximately by 20 mills, any increase to an individual's taxes will not be because of the actions of the school board.

I would encourage our patrons to take in a few sporting events as we have several Edmore students participating in fall sports of volleyball and football. They work hard to prepare for competition and are able to participate in a competitive sports coop with Langdon and Munich.

On behalf of the school board, I would like to thank the Edmore patrons for their continued support of Educating our children.


Alam Mo Ba? Did You Know?

MATH CORNER

Math 6

The chapter lesson for this month is about Numerical Expressions and Factors. It includes order of operations, which is an essential understanding for work in Mathematics. Some of the problems in the lessons integrate prior work with fractions and decimals.

Math 7

This class started learning Adding and Subtracting Rational Numbers. Rational numbers are introduced, and all the concepts and skills related to positive whole numbers, fractions, and decimals are explored for their opposite (numbers less than zero).

Math 8

The 8th graders are working on Equations. They build upon their prior skills with solving equations while integrating a review of operations with rational numbers.

Algebra 1

Chapter 1 lesson is all about Solving Linear Equations. The student applies her prior experience with the properties of equality and skills to solving linear equations. This will be connected to the skills of solving absolute value equations and rewriting equations and formulas.



MATHEMATICS TIME!

Geometry

The sophomores' first topic is about The Basics of Geometry. They will learn precise definitions of line, segment, and angle based on the undefined notions of point and line. They will make formal geometric constructions and perimeters and areas of polygons in the coordinate plane.

WOW PHILIPPINES!

The Chocolate Hills (Cebuano: Mga Bungtod sa Tsokolate, Tagalog: Mga Tsokolateng Burol) are a geological formation in the Bohol province of the Philippines. There are at least 1,260 hills, but there may be as many as 1,776 hills spread over an area of more than 50 square kilometers (20 sq mi). SCIENCE

This Month's Learning Focus:

Life Science

The first week of class for sixth- and seventh-graders began with a review of the nature of science and a lesson on characteristics of cells. This month, they will learn more about cell structure, and function and the ways in which they aid in the functioning of biological systems.



Earth Science

Students in grade 8 gained knowledge of experimental variables. The Earth's water and atmosphere will be covered in this month's lessons to illustrate how matter and energy move across the planet.



Our grade 9 student worked on sample problems about significant figures and unit conversion during the first few days of the week. The topics for this month will include an atom's structure and its subatomic particles as well as the classification and properties of matter.



The basic unit of life, the cell, will be thoroughly examined by students in grade 10. This month's topic, which started with the study of cells, will move on to cellular organelles and a variety of processes that happen inside the fundamental unit of life.

This quarter, the students will read varied literary texts that tackles different themes about life. The goal is for each student to develop their skills in analyzing texts.

In 6th grade, we are using the The Third Quest curriculum. This quarter will focus on reading narrative texts.

The novel of Ji-li Jiang during the Chinese Cultural Revolution entitled The Red Scarf Girl will be discussed in 7th Grade.

In 8th Grade, essays like Fish Cheeks by Amy Tan and Solo: A Memoir of Roald Dahl during the WWII will be studied.

The novel The Pearl by John Steinbeck and stories like Once Upon a Time by Nadine Gordimer and A Rose for Emily by William Faulkner will be analyzed in 9th Grade.

Moreover, the topic on Literary Theories and Greek Mythology will be given focus in the 10th Grade class particularly the Trojan War & Fall of Troy by Homer and Virgil.

Topics like Verbals, Phrases, Clauses, and Sentences will be given focus in Grammar.

For writing, Sentence Fragments and Run-On Sentences will be highlighted as well.




The students will work on their narrative essays this quarter.




